INTRODUCING THE OTHER ALLIED ORDERS

The DUVCW is one of five Orders established by the order of the Grand Army of the Republic. Together these organizations are referred to as the Allied Orders or the Allied Orders of the GAR. The five Orders goals include education, historic preservation of battlefields and monuments, fundraising for memorial and dedication ceremonies, and participation in patriotic observances and celebrations.

Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War

Created in 1881 by the GAR, membership is open to men who have an ancestor who either belonged to or was eligible to join the GAR (i.e., a Union Civil War veteran). A limited number of Associates may be part of a Camp. Associates are men who otherwise qualify for membership except for the existence of a Union Civil War ancestor.




Woman's Relief Corps

The official woman's auxiliary of the Grand Army of the Republic. Organized in 1883, membership is open to all women, regardless of ancestry, who ascribe to the principles of the Order. The express purpose of the Woman's Relief Corps is to perpetuate the memory of the Grand Army of the Republic.



Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic

An organization of ladies who trace their ancestry to a Union Civil War soldier, sailor, Marine or member of the Revenue Cutter Service, the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic meet in groups called Circles. Organized in 1881, it is the oldest Women's hereditary organization in the United States.



Auxiliary to the SUVCW

First called the "Ladies Aid Society," the Auxiliary was created in 1887. Its membership is open to women with Union Civil War veterans as ancestors as well as to spouses and daughters of members of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War.



“During the Civil War era Valentine’s Day cards were popular among the lonely soldiers and their waiting wives and sweethearts. The country had many plants that manufactured cards, targeting soldiers away from home. Some of the cards showed sweethearts parting and others pictured battlefield tents. Other Valentines were more creative, such as a heart split in two, reflecting the absence of their loved ones and the soldiers longing for their homes.

“Troops encamped in tents made window Valentines with flaps to reveal a soldier inside waiting for his sweetheart with open arms. Another popular novelty during the Civil War was a Valentine containing a lock of hair from a girlfriend or wife far away, which the soldiers treasured. Something known as a *Puzzle Purse* was invented during this time as well. These were formed by folding the four corners of a square envelope inward and writing a message on the inside of each flap. Many times the puzzle contained a piece of jewelry or a lock of a lover’s hair.”

Richard Cadbury, son of the founder of Cadbury Chocolate, created the first heart-shaped box filled with chocolate for Valentine’s Day in 1861.

“Today, according to the Greeting Card Association, an estimated 1 billion Valentine’s Day cards are sent each year, making Valentine’s Day the second largest card-sending holiday of the year. (An estimated 2.6 billion cards are sent for Christmas.)

Women purchase approximately 85 percent of all valentines.”


