Historical Notes on Our Order: Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War, 1861-1865

The Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War, 1861-1865, is an organization whose membership can trace its lineage to soldiers who served on the Union side in America's Civil War, 1861-1865. The DUVCW was founded in 1885 in Massillon, Ohio, and was originally called the National Alliance Daughters of Veterans. The Grand Army of the Republic, an organization of Union veterans, endorsed the daughters' group in 1900 at its annual meeting in Chicago. In 1925, the organization changed its name to the Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War. In 1944, the name changed again to include the dates of the war: Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War, 1861-1865. The National Headquarters is in Springfield, Illinois.

The DUVCW supports scholarships and projects that help preserve and maintain the history and legacy of the Union soldiers of the Civil War. These include maintenance of historic monuments, battlefields, sites and cemeteries; participating in Memorial Day events and other ceremonies; maintaining a museum; and volunteering and supporting veterans and veteran hospitals.

The Massillon Daughters who founded our organization were a group of dynamic young women with the forethought to honor their fathers for their service to perpetuate our country and freedom. Come and learn about these women at our August meeting which will be held virtually.

DOING OUR PART!

Encouraging the preservation of monuments is one of the responsibilities of the DUV. With this in mind, Tent 23 has applied for the Getzen Grant which is administered by the Walworth County Historical Society. The grant, in the amount of \$1,000 can be used for the restoration of the Civil War monument located in Spring Grove Cemetery. The monument needs to be cleaned of lichen and mold which have accumulated since the major restoration in 2013-14. The cleaning will require a bucket truck and an ample supply of **D-2**.

THE LONDON BRANCH OF AMERICAN CIVIL WAR VETERANS

At our recent 130th National Convention, the newsletter editor had the wonderful opportunity of conversing with Margaret Stromberg of the Elizabeth Van Lew Detached Tent 1 of Haymarket, Virginia. Stromberg shared that a British woman interested in joining our Order who was from England, contacted her citing her Civil War ancestor's history and the fact that she had located his grave site in London, completely restored the site and ordered a headstone for her ancestor from the U.S. government for installation at the cemetery in London.


Her ancestor was John Davis who had left his home in Hampshire, England at the age of 14 to go to America. He enlisted in the Civil War and was one of only eight survivors on November 11, 1864 when the USS Tulip exploded on the Potomac River. After the war, Davis returned to London and while devoting the remainder of his life to the London City Mission he came across other Civil War veterans that had fallen on hard times.

He decided to aid these comrades by helping them claim their pensions from the United States government and so the London Branch of American Civil War Veterans was established in 1910. The organization grew to a membership of 60.

STAY SAFE!

It would be most interesting to know if there are other countries whose citizens came to America and fought for the Union and then returned to their "home" country. This concept certainly warrants further investigation and allows for our membership to grow and be recognized internationally.
