WE DID IT!

Tent 23 has completed their historic preservation project with the cleaning of the Civil War Monument located in Spring Grove Cemetery in Delavan. The project was completed a week before Veterans Day. The monument honors the 76 Civil War soldiers from the Delavan area who were casualties of the Great Rebellion.

Tent 23 had applied for and received the Getzen Grant for restoration and maintenance of cemeteries in Walworth County. The grant is administered by the Walworth County Historical Society and is in the amount of \$1,000.

The Tent had been instrumental in the initial preservation of the monument in 2012 when Ken Wargo undertook a major restoration of the structure which was donated by James and Susan Aram and installed at the cemetery on Memorial Day in 1870. Since the 2012 restoration, the monument has acquired significant mold, lichen and staining.

The Tent employed the Good Tree Service from East Troy. Jim Good and two of his employees, Dan and Avenido used a bucket truck to reach the pedestal and stately eagle. With the application of the biologic agent D/2 and significant scrubbing, the monument was cleaned. A final application of D/2 was applied to allow for additional cleaning from impending rain and snow.

THANKING OUR VETERANS FOR THEIR SERVICE

Veterans Day, celebrated on Nov. 11 is an official federal holiday that honors those who have served in the U.S. armed forces. Initially the day was celebrated as Armistice Day or Remembrance Day, honoring all those in the military who died in what was called “The Great War” (World War I). The armistice that ended hostilities went into effect at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month in 1918. The first Armistice Day was observed on the first anniversary of that date and honored soldiers from that conflict. Following World War II, Raymond Weeks a veteran from Alabama led a delegation to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower to asking that Armistice Day celebrate all veterans, not only those who had died in World War I. Nine years later, as President Eisenhower signed into law a bill designating Armistice Day to celebrate all veterans. Congress then amended the act, replacing “Armistice” with “Veterans,” and it has remained Veterans Day (with no apostrophe) since. Veterans Day recognizes all those who have served. In 1971, the Uniform Holiday Bill moved the observance of Veterans Day to the fourth Monday in October. In 1975, President Gerald Ford, noting the historical significance of the date, returned Veterans Day to Nov. 11. Listed below are the veterans that we have sent cards to this year.
