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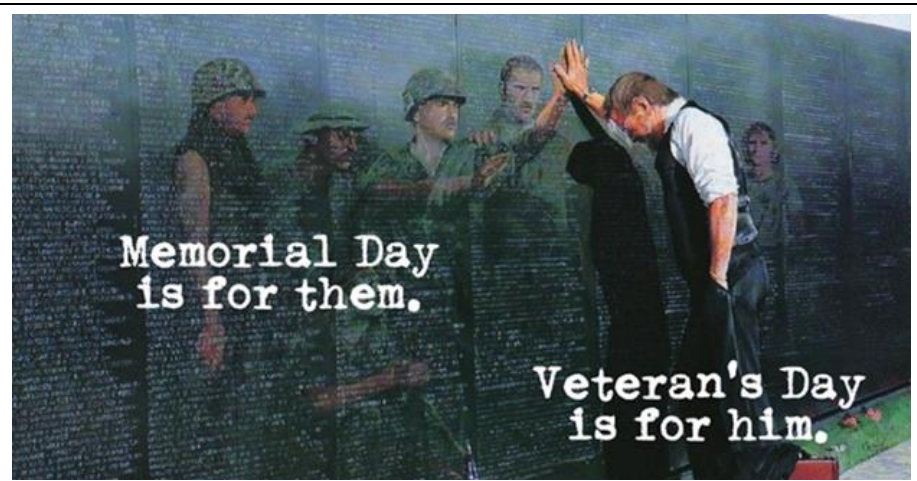

DELAVAN, WI TO CELEBRATE MEMORIAL DAY

This year Delavan will resume their annual commemorative celebration of Memorial Day on Monday, May 31st. A parade will kick-off the event at 9:00 a.m. on Walworth Avenue and proceed to Spring Grove Cemetery. The ceremony will take place at the Civil War monument and will be conducted by Delavan's American Legion Post #95. The Delavan Post was established on December 4, 1919 and with over 200 members is the largest Post in Walworth County. The Mary Chesebro Lee Tent will participate in the parade. In addition, the Tent will lay a wreath at the cemetery honoring our Civil War ancestors who died to preserve the Union and to keep alive the history of those who gave their all in the heroic struggle for the maintenance of our free government. INDEPENDENCE DAY PROGRAM, July 4th

The program will start at 1:00 PM at the graveside of Nathaniel Ames at the Pioneer Mound Cemetery in Oregon, WI on Sunday, July 4. (Nathaniel Ames was Wisconsin's last surviving veteran of the American Revolution.) The cemetery is located on Main Street (CTH MM) on the north side of the Village of Oregon.



WALWORTH COUNTY WISCONSIN'S LITTLE KNOWN IMPACT ON THE CIVIL WAR

"Lorena" was one of the most popular songs in the United States immediately prior to and during the Civil War; based on a true story, its origins are extremely well documented. It started life as a poem by a Presbyterian Minister in Zanesville, Ohio, the Reverend Henry De Lafayette Webster (1824-96) wrote it in 1856 after family opposition blocked his marriage to nineteen year old Ella Blocksom, who sang in his choir. When the relationship was ended, he resigned his post and shortly met Joseph Philbrick Webster, noted music composer who set it to music. Joseph Philbrick Webster became a renowned citizen of Elkhorn, Wisconsin.

The heroine was originally called Bertha, but the composer altered this because he needed a three syllabled named. Lorena is an adaptation of Lenore, from the Edgar Allen Poe poem The Raven.

The line "If we try, we may forget" is taken from Ella's parting letter to Henry. She went on to marry William Wartenbee Johnson, who sat on the Ohio Supreme Court from 1879-86. She is buried in Woodland Cemetery, Ironton, Ohio.

"Lorena" was popular with soldiers on both sides of the conflict; one Confederate officer even blamed it for the South's defeat, reasoning that it made soldiers homesick and ineffective. Those Confederate soldiers who sat around the evening campfires listening to "Lorena" and dreaming of their sweethearts at home often left their regiments to return home. The song had such an impact on the war that Confederate generals offered a bounty on the heads of the Websters.

Joseph Philbrick Webster also composed the music for the hymn "The Sweet Bye and Bye" which was popular during the Civil War. His home in Elkhorn, WI is currently open as a house museum. (Songfacts)
