UNCLE SAM

According to legend, the character came into use during the War of 1812 and may have been named for Samuel Wilson. The actual origin is obscure. The first reference to Uncle Sam in formal literature (as distinct from newspapers) was in the 1816 allegorical book, The Adventures of Uncle Sam.

The precise origin of the Uncle Sam character is unclear, but a popular legend is that the name "Uncle Sam" was derived from Samuel Wilson, a meatpacker from Troy, New York, who supplied rations for American soldiers during the War of 1812. There was a requirement at the time for contractors to stamp their name and where the rations came from onto the food they were sending. Wilson's packages were labeled "E.A.—U.S." When someone asked what that stood for, a co-worker jokingly said, "Elbert Anderson [the contractor] and Uncle Sam," referring to Wilson, though the U.S. actually stood for "United States".

At our "Christmas in July" meeting, Linda Tanner-Freitag was the recipient of Uncle Sam who came wrapped in a large box. Uncle Sam was a "gag" gift supplied by the always creative Barb Steuer. The gift was opened after the conclusion of a dice game which was popular during the Civil War.










National Administrative Officers for 2024-2025 Norma Fiedler, National President Elected National Officers for 2024-2025 Pat Blackmer will serve as Council 2

She was born in Elkhorn, WI on January 17, 1942 to Lewis and Olive (Mitchell) Larsen. Kathy was united in marriage to Peter Willemsen on November 7, 1964. He passed away on May 20, 2017. Kathy was an avid artist and also belonged to the DUVCW. Kathy was a charter member of the Mary Chesebro Lee Tent 23 and had served as a Patriotic Instructor for the Order.

Services were held at 10:00 A.M. on Saturday, August 10, 2024 at Monroe Funeral Home, 604 E. Walworth Ave in Delavan. Visitation was held from 9:00 A.M. until the time of the service on Saturday at the funeral home. Burial took place at Roselawn Memory Gardens in Lake Geneva.
