The Wisconsin Department of Veterans Affairs has a dynamic young Women's Veterans Coordinator who will be our guest speaker this month. Jodi Barnett is a retired Navy Veteran who had received top secret clearance and served for 20 years. She was on active duty during 9/11.

Her interesting presentation will reflect on Wisconsin women veterans who were active in WWI, WWII, other conflicts and present day.

It is interesting to note that there are an estimated 383,000 veterans in the state of Wisconsin. Of that number only 10 percent are estimated to be women. The state of Alaska is home to the highest number of women veterans.

Information released by the Department of Veteran Affairs revealed that the suicide rate of women who have served in the military is twice as high as women who have not. Homelessness experienced among women veterans again is twice as likely to occur.

The purpose of Barnett's presentation is to impart information. She is firmly committed to "promoting and supporting recognition of women veterans in our state".





AMERICAN BATTLEFIELD TRUST

"Between 1861 and 1865, 10,000 battles and engagements were fought across the continent, from Vermont to the New Mexico Territory, and beyond. The four-year struggle between north and south made heroes of citizen soldiers, forever changed the role of women in society, and freed more than 3 million slaves. In the end, 620,000 or more Americans were left dead in its wake." This is a quote from the American Battlefield Trust regarding the Civil War.

As Daughters of Union Veterans, one of our "objects" is to assure that we assist with the historic preservation of sites where our ancestors fought.

Currently, the Trust has 145 sites in 25 states that are protected from development. Most recently, the Trust has acquired 15 acres at Gettysburg's Willoughby Run (below) for three million dollars. The site was to be developed into 120 apartments housed in eight buildings of varying height. Willoughby's Run saw some of the earliest battles at Gettysburg.

A small donation on our part would assist the Trust in raising the needed funding. A generous benefactor has already donated half of the total needed.
