




54th Patriotic Luncheon

FEBRUARY CELEBRATES BLACK HISTORY

You may not be aware of the fact that Blacks were not able to join the Union Troops until January 1, 1863 when Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation. Prior to that date Black men who wished to support the war effort were employed as cooks, drivers and scouts.

In Wisconsin's Civil War history, we find that 129 Black soldiers from our state, Illinois and Missouri were members of Co. F of the 29th US Colored Troops.

Another 224 African Americans in Wisconsin joined other units in LaCrosse, Milwaukee and Prairie du Chien.

The late Maude Totten, Civil War historian of Walworth County, has indicated in her research that eight Black soldiers enlisted from our county, three of which are interred in Spring Grove Cemetery in Delavan. Totten, who began a book on the Civil War history of Walworth County was unable to complete her volume. The lengthy tome is housed at the Walworth County Historical Society waiting for someone to complete her life work. During her life time, Totten obtained all of the records of Walworth County individuals who had enlisted in the Civil War from the National Archives in Washington, D.C.

ANNIVERSARY OF PRESIDENT LINCOLN'S DEATH

There will be two events held at Lincoln's Tomb in Oak Ridge Cemetery in Springfield, IL.

The host on Saturday, April 13, 2024 will be the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War.

On Monday, April 15th, the National Lincoln Monument Association will celebrate the anniversary.
