THE WESTSIDE SOLDIERS AID SOCIETY SANITARY FAIR

Charlene Staples reported on the Kenosha's Civil War Museum's annual Salute to Freedom event in June, which included a soldier's aid fair, also known as a "Sanitary Fair," put on by the Westside Soldiers Aid Society of Milwaukee. Sanitary Fairs were fundraising events to benefit veterans in the Civil War. The name "sanitary fair" came from nurses in the war who were part of the sanitary commission. Because of the number of soldiers that became sick from dysentery and other diseases, the sanitary commission was formed to make sure regulations were followed for latrines and other sanitary measures. At the Milwaukee fair in June, over \$700 was raised to benefit today's veterans. Kids got 10 free tokens to start with to spend on booths and displays including a fortune teller booth that handed out fortunes on small cards.

Sandy Stratmeyer attended "A Soldier's Reasonable Service" at Trinity Free Lutheran Church in Janesville on June 15. Modeled after actual sermons delivered during the Civil War, it was prepared by Chaplain Services of the 42nd PA Vol. Inf. Co. B and included a violinist playing old tunes. It was done in the old King James version and included a Confession of Sin covering all 10 Commandments.

COINS LEFT ON TOMBSTONES

Have you ever visited a cemetery and seen coins on a tombstone only to wonder what was the meaning behind that gesture? They are left on the headstones of people who have given their lives while serving in the armed forces as a sign to the family that someone has visited the grave to pay respect. Different coins have different meanings.

A penny just indicates that you visited the grave.

A nickel shows that you were at boot camp together.

A dime is a sign that you served together.

A quarter means you were with the soldier when he was killed.

So what happens to the money left at the gravesites? In national cemeteries and state veterans cemeteries it is collected and applied toward maintaining the cemetery or for burial costs of indigent veterans.

Although the practice of leaving coins on the graves of soldiers goes back to the Roman Empire, the practice of leaving coins at gravesites in the U.S. became common during the Vietnam War. It was a way to communicate to the deceased's family that you had visited the grave without

directly contacting the soldier's family, thus avoiding a potential argument about the unpopular war.
